Learn About Urbandale's History

The stated purpose of the Urbandale Historical Society is to collect, preserve and maintain historical memorabilia of

Urbandale. The objectives of the Society are to educate and make available to all people information pertinent to the development and growth of the area immediately surrounding and including the city of Urbandale, Polk County and Iowa.

The information collected about Urbandale is basically preserved at the Olmsted-Urban House, 4010 70th St. There is no official publication. Because the Historical Society members are all volunteer, there is no paid staff to have the House open on a regular basis. A collection of the newsletters is also in the vertical file at the Urbandale Public Library along with other interesting information regarding the history of Urbandale.

Urbandale Citizen of the Year

Urbandale Chamber of Commerce has a history of annually honoring an Urbandale resident as Citizen of the Year. Pat Finnerty, an Historical Society Board Member was recognized at the Chambers *Sample Urbandale*, a *Celebration of Business Event* this past November.

The Citizen of the Year may be just a resident, a business owner, or someone affiliated with a business in Urbandale. Involvement in a variety of civic activities is a primary consideration. Over 50 persons have been honored over the decades.

Barney Wilder, pharmacist was the first recipient honored in 1965 for his many contributions to the welfare of Urbandale residents. Recognition of his accomplishments gives an insight into what was important to the growing community of over 6,000 people in the 1960's. Wilder sponsored training programs for student pharmacists, worked with the Urbandale Booster Club and Lions Club, furnished resuscitation equipment for the expanding volunteer fire department, gave gifts to new mothers and their babies, and furnished three television sets for shut-ins.

Iyleene Lemon in 1971 was the first woman to receive the award. She had served on the City Council, helped bring the first Library/City Hall to a vote of the people, served on the Library Board for 10 years and even promoted tennis courts at Lions Park. She was acknowledged for helping organize the City Hostess Plan to welcome newcomers to Urbandale. During her years she estimated her calls on newcomers had totaled over 4,000. She was also well known for her work with advertising sales for the hometown newspaper *Urbandale News* for many years. Over the decades Iyleene has continued her interest in the community and even now is a supporter of the Downtown Neighborhood Association and the Urbandale Historical Society.

Many former *Citizen of the Year* winners have continued work for Urbandale in a variety of ways at City departments, appointments to Boards, serving City Council term and taking active roles with many civic organizations.

Over the 50 years some of those honored have passed away but some names still familiar include: Marilyn Kollmorgen, Mike Carver, George Long, Don Avaux, Don Brush, E.J. Giovannetti, Bill Lawson, Ron Cross, Steve Lytle, Phil Noah, Bob Simon, Greg Robinson, Al Kuduce, Al Cross, Mark Courter, John Forbes, Mary Polson, Sheila Twaroski, Bruce Bernard, Larry Jablonski, Monte Halferty, Rodger Curnow, and last year's recipient Betty Devine. It is not surprising that many have been long-time members of the Historical Society.

Now, following the tradition of service to the community is 2018 Citizen of the Year Pat Finnerty. Pat and his wife Marilyn came to Urbandale in 1983 and he soon became a dedicated volunteer in the community. He coached UGRA girls' softball in the late 80's and early 90's and served on the School Districts Board of Directors for over 12 years, including six years as president. Pat has served the City though membership on the Beautification Committee, Community Action Council and Senior Center Advisory Board. He participated in the Urbandale Citizens Police Academy, was president of Lions Club and is active in St. Pius

Catholic Church where he served on the Parish Council. Pat is a retired Professor Emeritus of Des Moines University. With a long-time interest in history in recent years he was named to the Board of the Urbandale Historical Society. In addition to helping with Buildings and Grounds, he has taken active leadership in the areas of membership, newsletter preparation, computerized organization of community information and planning for the electronic preservation of Historical Society records.

A brick with his name will be placed with other honorees in the Walk of History that leads up to the Olmsted-Urban House.

Urbandale Chamber Hall of Fame

A unique honor was given to Historical Society Board Member Virginia Gee when she was named to the Urbandale Chamber Hall of Fame at a recent Chamber event this past November.

Not automatically awarded annually, this recognizes people who have made a long-time contribution to the community. Previous winners have included city officials, school administrators, Chamber leaders and notable achievers. Virginia commented that "she was honored to represent the ordinary citizens who volunteer to serve the community in many ways."

Starting in 2000 the recipients have been Leonard Eichaker, Sue Mears, Shar Pardubsky, Wayne Robbins, Marilyn Kollmorgen, Julie Kroll, E. J. Giovannetti, Dick Christian, Bob Layton, Brad Zaun, Jack Gooding, Larry Jablonski, Mark Nagel, Greg Robinson, Don and Kathryn Brush, Bill Lawson, Scott Raecker, Greg Edwards, Robert Andeweg and Officer Justin Martin.

Virginia and her husband Don moved to Urbandale in 1969. When daughter Lorrie started school across the street at Jensen Elementary Virginia began her many years of school related volunteerism with the newly formed Jensen School PTO on up to the formation of the Urbandale High School Performing Arts Booster Club. She worked for the Urbandale School District to expand the Adult Education Program. She was employed for many years at the Urbandale Library when it was located on Aurora and for 10 more years at the 86th Street location.

She has been a long-time member of Aldersgate United Methodist Church, Lioness Club, Senior Center activities and just completed three years as president of the Urbandale Garden Club. Through the years she has served on a variety of City committees and most recently the Urbandale Centennial Committee.

But, Virginia feels her greatest contribution has been her volunteer work for over 30 years with the Historical Society. She has held a variety of Board positions related to acquisitions and upkeep of the Olmsted-Urban House but her main focus has been on local history, collecting and organizing a variety of materials and doing research for the newsletters and the website.

For the past year Virginia has contributed articles for the URBANDALE LIVING magazine that is delivered monthly to residents in Urbandale. Some of the topics have been Early Holiday Celebrations, History of Rider Corner, Urbandale Mayors in the First 25 Years, Public Gardens, Water Shortage of 1935, Fourth of July Celebrations and the Urbandale Fire Department.

Following the tradition of the long-time Society president Madeline Kaloides, Virginia has become a spokesperson for the Society presenting programs for club and community meetings and school groups. For these many years of service to the community she has been named to the Urbandale Hall of Fame.

Endow Urbandale Grant

The Urbandale community foundation, **Endow Urbandale**, graciously honored the Urbandale Historical Society with a substantial grant this past November that will be used for sidewalk repair work at the Olmsted-Urban house property. We are very grateful for their support.

- d. Light housecleaning.

4. RECORDS AND HISTORY

- a. Light office work in maintaining the records and inventory of the membership rolls, materials and holdings of the Society.
- b. Provide assistance with developing and cataloging the materials in an electronic fashion.
- Develop and disseminate the quarterly newsletter and other communications of the Society including the website.
- d. Provide assistance with the Acquisitions and Restorations of materials.

5. OPEN HOUSES AND TOURS

a. Provide assistance with the monthly Open houses and special tours.

6. SPECIAL EVENTS AND PROJECTS

- a. Provide and coordinate for the special events: Ice Cream Social and Christmas Open House.
- b. Provide and develop ideas for other special events or projects.

7. **Publicity**

a. Develop and disseminate publicity items to local venues to promote the Society and its events.

This is only a proposed structure, but it describes our thinking of developing an organizational structure which would provide more opportunities for our membership to become active and engaged participants in the Urbandale Historical Society.
