Ice Cream Social





- Mar. 10, Retired Fire Chief Jerry Holt will be with us for his history of the Urbandale Fire Department.

- May or June will feature Staci Stanton and others from the Urbandale Library telling us about the history of the Library in Urbandale.

Rolling Green (Rams)

This past July saw the end of an era with the closing of Rolling Green elementary school. Rolling Green's closing coincides with the opening of the newly built Valerius elementary this August.



Rolling Green was the last of the 'boom period' elementary schools to be built in Urbandale. The 'boom period' is considered the baby boom era of 1952-75 for Urbandale. During this time the population in Urbandale went from 1,777 (1950) to 14,343 (1970). In response the school district built and opened all of the schools we now recognize as Urbandale schools (except for Webster – built in 2006).

Rolling Green was constructed in 1968 and opened that Fall. This school was special at the time as it sported an 'open classroom' arrangement, then a very modern approach to education.

This pioneering educational strategy had the extra advantage of being less costly (walls cost money). It is worth noting that when Rolling Green opened, there was no road or parking lot on the east side of the school. The front door of the school faced Airline which was not paved at that time.



Over the many years it has gone from a neighborhood school with a cutting-edge approach, to a traditional school, to one with combined classes, back to traditional, then to Rescheduling, back to traditional and finally a year-round school. In its time it has seen a many children and staff go through its doors and it has molded many fine men and women of today.



A special feature of Rolling Green are the mosaic tiles in the work room. These were created by students over the decades and represent almost every class from the 70s through the 80s and beyond.



The 5th grade students in 1993 were inspired by a video shown by teacher Bev Ellis about Iowa's lands to create a quilt depicting various environmental issues. This project grew to include over two dozen students (pictured: Amanda Jagim, Amy Gustafson,



Alejandro Oyarzabel, Jodi Kopp, D.J. Grisvold, Lindsey Thomas, Phaedra Gay, Anne Hummel, David Burrell, Grace Kaing, Katie Quail, Mandy Nichol, Kenny Layton, Josh Ingram, Travis Brown, Rachel Sandler, Jody McCann, Danny Hays, Tim Jones, Jason Ness, Sarah Stevens, Rachel Falvo, Ryan Paige, Kathleen Finnerty and Lindsey Crowley), teachers Jan Gunder, Tim Long, Mary Ann Rosonke, Ellis and even High School Principal Bob Stouffer as well as Nancy Pelley (a gifted quilter in the community and wife of School Board member Frank Pelley). Nancy Pelley also created the quilt at the High School Media Center.

Despite the building undergoing remodeling, expansion and curricular changes over its lifetime its character has

not changed. The students and staff will all say that Rolling Green has always been a family of families.

Shortly after opening in 1968, Rolling Green suffered a tragedy in the loss of one of its own to a senseless murder of Pamela Powers. Her family and the Rolling Green PTA donated a painting of an ocean scene in her



memory which graced the hallway of the school with the saying "May the education offered at this school be as vast as the ocean", I believe that this wish has been fulfilled.



So many great memories held by students, staff and parents: visit

by Japanese dignitaries from our Sister City, UGRA softball at the Rolling Green field, putting in a new playground, Christmas bazaars (still have several priceless mementos), musicals and on and on



The year-round school hosted at Rolling Green has moved to Karen Acres. Rolling Green will be used this Fall as a facility for the Metro West program while their building undergoes remodeling. After that, who knows what the next iteration of Rolling Green will hold.

Restoration of the Olmsted-Urban House

In November 2019 the Olmsted-Urban House was placed on the National Register of Historic Places as an example of the four-square architecture popular in the early 1900s. But what of the interior?

When the Historical Society had the opportunity to purchase the property from John Urban in 1987, the House had been vacant. The Urban family had moved to Urbandale in 1947 and played an important role in the community. Matie Urban continued to live in the House after her husband Karl died in 1978. Only in her later years did she go to live with her son John in New Mexico, before her death in 1986. Matie had made few changes in the House and the decor reflected earlier days. After the sale to the Society, John left some of the larger furniture items such as the piano, dining room set and buffet, and living room chairs that could be reupholstered. Many other items that had accumulated had to be discarded.



Under the leadership of Society President Madeline Kaloides committees were formed to make plans for restoration of the house. First a decision had to be made regarding the use of the House. It was determined that it would be a place where the historic memorabilia that had already been collected could be displayed without being set up as a formal museum. Second, it could serve as a meeting place with space for tables and chairs and a usable kitchen. Third, the first floor could be furnished as if a family was living there, not when the House was built in 1904, but as "Grandma's House" in the period of the 1920s and

1930s. One room was to be used as an office and to store printed materials.

Under the leadership of Wayne Robbins, Don Avaux and other volunteers work ensued involving removal of the white paint and revarnishing the staircase and woodwork. Changes in the interior had to meet city regulations and be made handicapped accessible. A bathroom near the back entrance was added. Knowledgeable business people were consulted in selecting new carpet, and wallpaper for the living room and dining room areas. Several framed pictures common to the period were used. Members of the community donated card tables and chairs so meetings could be held.

Marilyn Kollmorgan led a committee working on the kitchen and pantry. A Hoosier cabinet and old-style refrigerator were purchased.



Ellen Valerius (of Valerius farm and school) donated the kitchen stove and Don and Katherine Brush provided the sink. Through the years various people

have donated vintage dishes, kitchen utensils and pantry items for display and use. Plans were eventually made to serve luncheons as a money-making venture using the collection of green FireKing dishes. Joanne Hansen prepared the food assisted by Mary Looney, Deloris Van Horn, Mary Osborn, Virginia Gee and others as servers.

On the second floor there was no need to restore all the original five bedrooms but to develop the space with a variety of uses. What had been John's bedroom is now a toy room with an interesting collection of games, dolls, clothing and child-sized furnishings. Some of the more valuable items are arranged in a display case against the west wall. Carol Lee Riekenberg has done much to develop the displays in this room.

Beth Haigh and Questers groups furnished another room with period clothing (some on dress forms) and accessories reflecting both women's and men's wear over the decades. A highlight in this room is the collection of framed pictures of the five Olmsted girls and their Grandmother Charlotte Olmsted.



The master bedroom, which had originally been two rooms with a stairway to the attic, now has some clothing items and furnishings that had belonged to the original Olmsted family. Chests of drawers, the bed, cedar chest and trunks, lamps, pictures and a historical loomed coverlet have all been donated.

The room in the northwest corner of the House has been designated as the Heritage Room. Included are items from the schools and the community representing all periods of Urbandale's history. Meribeth Haynes and other Urbandale High School Alumni are making plans to collect and display items related to the schools. Donations of photos and memorabilia are appreciated. The complete collection of UHS yearbooks and copies of the early newspaper '*BluJay Chatter*' are of special interest.

How can you view these interesting items? The House is open to visitors the first Sunday of each month from 2-4 p.m. These times are planned as an Open House so you or family can visit at your own pace. A volunteer will be available to answer questions. You do not need an appointment. These informal Open House visits do not replace the Holiday Open House in December when the entire House is decorated for Christmas and music and refreshments are available.

It's amazing to see how many items have been acquired since the House first purchased in 1987.

In the meantime, we have found a new home for the Wayne Robbins **Buddy L memorial train**. Gail Huitt, brother of Norm Huitt, was visiting from California. Together, they installed a large shelf in the office to display the train. They also installed another shelf in the barn to hold various items of interest. Also, Joe Lamb is working on the Lamb Dairy display in the Barn.


Memorials

Joanne Robbins passed away July 30 at Bishop Drumm Care Center in Johnston. She and husband Wayne, who died in 2016 were longtime Urbandale residents with their home on 70th Street. They both played important roles in the growth of the Urbandale Historical Society with Wayne on the Board as head of the Building and Grounds Committee and 14 years as President. Joanne was treasurer for the Society for a number of years. From the 1980s Wayne was instrumental in all phases of the work related to the

acquisition, restoration and maintenance of the Olmsted-Urban House. Through his leadership the Barn was built. Joanne helped with many of the projects and activities of the Society, especially the Ice Cream Social. She was assisted in later years by daughters Jeri Pilmer and Linda Coop. The Historical Society owes much to the work of the Robbins Family.

Longtime Society member **Carroll Edwards** passed away June 4. He and wife Maxine have helped the Society in a variety of ways through the years. He enjoyed participating in the program meetings and even shared his experiences and donated a pair of roller skates in a case for the program that was held about the Roller Rink in Urbandale. He helped Maxine and the Garden Club with the work in establishing the Pollinator Garden and donated several items for the Barn. Maxine continues to live in their home on Airline.
