Tom Boesen, florist, will recount some of the highlights of the family business from when his grandparents came to Iowa and purchased a greenhouse in the Beaverdale area in 1912. Most Urbandale residents are familiar with the location at 3422 Beaver Avenue, though in recent years it has been possible to also purchase a variety of Boesen floral items at the Dahl's stores.

Tom has many interesting stories to tell of how the growth, purchase, and distribution of flowers and arrangements has changed in nearly 100 years.

Fall Bus Trip to Waterloo, Iowa

Waterloo is the destination for the fall bus trip on Tuesday, October 11th. There will be something of interest for everyone on this historical tour.

The bus will load at Welter Office Supply at 70th and Douglas, at 6:45 a.m. This is earlier than in past years, so we can meet our reserved time for a guided tour of John Deere operations, where tractors are assembled. The tour includes the engine works, drive train assembly, and service parts operations. A tram is provided for the factory tour; but there will be some walking, and visitors are asked to not wear open-toed shoes.

Lunch will be served at the historic CU Restaurant with its distinctive décor that features a number of copper items and artwork.

In the afternoon we will first visit one of the newer Iowa museums, the Sullivan Iowa Veterans Museum. It honors all Iowa veterans who served in the defense of the nation from the Civil War to the present conflicts. Artifacts, uniforms, photos and other historical items are displayed with narrative accounts in an inspiring tribute to our servicemen and women.

In the adjoining Grout Museum the historical collection focuses on life from the period of 1833 when Iowa was opened for settlement to the present. Family life during the pioneer era is depicted with full scale dioramas in Pioneer Hall. Community growth and new inventions in the last 100 years are shown in Industrial Hall. Artifacts throughout the building represent all types of memorabilia and you can spend time viewing the many collections that are of greatest interest to you.

The cost of the trip is \$70.00 which includes transportation, lunch and museum fees. Coffee, water, pop and muffins will be provided on the bus.

Leadership Urbandale Class of 2011 / BRAVO Grant

The Leadership Urbandale Class of 2011 has been instrumental in helping the Urbandale Historical Society plan for the future. Paul Pletzsch and Kirsten Phillips helped Wayne Robbins prepare the application for a Bravo Cultural Enrichment Grant. The Society has been notified that a grant of \$5,000 is to be awarded.

The request was based on this summary, "Urbandale Historical Society was incorporated January 13, 1977. Its mission is to collect, preserve, and maintain historical memorabilia of Urbandale and to education and make available to all people information pertinent to the development and growth of the area immediately surrounding and including the city of Urbandale. Use of the funds requested is to assist in modernizing our communication and archiving system, upgrading our marketing tools, signage and security to increase visibility, and awareness of our organization and therefore experience growth in our membership and volunteer base. These functions would take place by: gaining internet access and having a presence on the worldwide web, purchasing archiving software to preserve and scan historical documents / pictures in a digital format and by updating outside lighting, signage and securing around the Olmsted-Urban House for added visibility in the community."

The grant received will not cover all the items initially requested, but will give us a good start and help us establish some goals for the future. To follow-up with the requirements of the grant, the Society will be required to provide statistics of attendance participation in programs and activities sponsored by the Society. This is to document how we impact not only Urbandale, but other are municipalities. Visitors will be asked to sign their name and zip code at each event. Please try to attend as many of our

programs as possible, and invite your friends, to show we deserve the grant money and are putting it to good use.

Computer Cataloging

A big challenge for the Historical Society is to provide a more permanent record of the items that have been donated or purchased for the Olmsted-Urban House and Barn since 1987 when the property was purchased from John Urban.

One of the goals established by the leadership Urbandale Class was to help the Society purchase a computer to help us organize our records. Past Perfect Museum software is an archival program used by "museums" all over the United States including the Living History Farms and the Warren County Historical Society in Indianola.

The purchases were made this spring. Darlene Danielson of the Leadership group has continued to help this summer to install the computer software and get the program started. Although this program has more capabilities than we will need at this time, it provides a systematic way to get started. Currently most items have just been listed on a page in a notebook under the name of each donor. Some acquisition lists were recorded on her home computer by Carol Lee Riekenberg several years ago.

One of the first steps is to make a list and assign a number for each donor. More than 150 donor names have been recorded so far. Next, a computer record will be established for major items as they are acquisitioned and catalogued according to specific standard terms and categories. Eventually, for larger and more valuable items a picture can be included with the computer record. There are hundreds of items to be catalogued from single documents, kitchen utensils, dishes, hand tools, toys, dresses, etc. to large pieces of furniture and farm equipment. Let Virginia know if you can help in some aspect of this work in progress.

A Special Tribute to Veterans

Bill Lawson and Urbandale Friends of the Park are leading an effort to add a "Memorial to Veterans" in the Charles Gabus Memorial Tree Park and Garden, south of the Urbandale Library.

Engraved bricks can be purchased with three lines for \$100 per brick. Suggestions include name, branch of service and war. Proceeds will go toward the cost of the memorials.

Bill will be at the September 12th meeting of the Historical Society to explain the plans. When funds are raised and plans finalized it is hoped the memorials can be completed next spring.
